





Lake Grace – Researching into free camping sites in Lake Grace and Newdegate. Commencing a short-term accommodation survey with Shires of West Aurthur, Dumbleyung and Lake Grace. Newdegate have national stars attending their centenary celebrations. New publican at Lake Grace. Held successful Astrotourism event in Lake Grace. New map and visitor guide being developed and will be available to view at the new meeting. New management on Motel and both cafes.

Bruce Rock – CRC received funding through Live Music Program – 10 bands coming to Bruce Rock to perform over a few months. At the end Bruce Rock will aim to put together a 3-day music festival event. Opportunity for surrounding Shire's to capitalize on visiting bands for their own towns. Caravan Park upgrade complete. New ownership at the Pub.

Corrigin – High number of tourists regularly exploring over the past month. High numbers in free RV stop. Updating tourism signage around the town. Rotary Park is progressing with Phase 1 almost complete. Updating wildflower season brochure. Blaze Aid has been in town for a couple months helping with fire cleanup.

Narembeen – Caravan Park finished, and entry statement done. Black spot funding to make roads around the shire building safer. Revamped promotion of the Narembeen Museum. QR codes on new welcome signage at caravan park. Footpath around Walkers Lake, also adding exercise equipment as park of the footpath trail for community use.

Quairading – New publicans. Started discussion about Astrotourism and its value add.

Register your RAT

Everyone who receives a positive rapid antigen test (RAT) result needs to register it on the HealthyWA <u>portal</u> as soon as possible – preferably on the same day as the test result.

Registering a positive RAT result prompts WA Health to send a SMS with a short survey to determine if you need extra support during isolation. This SMS can be used as evidence of your COVID-19 positive status and cannot be issued retrospectively.

If you return a positive RAT result, no further testing is required, unless instructed by Public Health.

If you require assistance registering your positive RAT result phone 13 COVID (13 268 43). More information, including RAT FAQs, is available at HealthyWA.

Close contact testing and isolation guide

If you have been identified as a close contact, you should refer to <u>HealthyWA</u> for the testing and isolation requirements during the 7-day close contact period.

Close contacts must isolate, however close contacts with **no symptoms** can leave home if they meet certain criteria. If you do not meet these criteria, you cannot leave isolation during the 7-day isolation period.

Close contacts who have or develop symptoms must get tested immediately, isolate and follow the instructions for 'close contacts **with** symptoms' on HealthyWA.

WA Free RAT Program

General practitioners (GPs) and all general practice staff are eligible to receive 10 free rapid antigen tests (RATs), available for collection from COVID vaccination clinics in the Perth metropolitan area and at multiple regional sites. Households that have not yet received their free 15 RATs have been emailed and can choose to collect their RATs from any collection point or have them redirected to their address. People must show the email they received when collecting their household RATs.

Temporary COVID-19 booster exemptions

The mandatory vaccination policy has been updated following the recent Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) <u>advice</u> that all people should wait for three months after confirmed COVID-19 infection before they receive their next COVID-19 vaccine dose.

As such, a person who is required to have booster vaccination under the mandatory vaccination policy and has been diagnosed with COVID-19 is exempt from receiving a booster vaccination for a period of four months from the date of their infection.

Approved evidence must be presented for inspection, recording and/or retention of a copy by the employer or the owner of the premises where the person works. Approved evidence is:

- an SMS or email that the person has received from the WA Health Department confirming registration of the person's positive rapid antigen test result or confirmation of the person's positive PCR test result
- an SMS or email from another State or Territory health department confirming registration of the person's positive rapid antigen test result or confirmation of the person's positive PCR test result
- a printout from a pathology laboratory of the person's positive PCR test result
- a doctor's letter confirming that the person has been diagnosed with COVID-19 and the date of infection.

Mandatory Vaccination of Workers and Proof of Vaccination Directions – 27 May 2022

After COVID-19

Most people with COVID-19 will recover completely within a couple of weeks. Advice is available on the HealthyWA website for people who have recovered from COVID-19, including:

- how to look after your health after the acute infection has resolved
- what to do if symptoms persist for an extended period
- what to do if you're exposed to COVID-19 again
- what to do if you develop COVID-like symptoms again.

People <u>diagnosed</u> with COVID-19 and people who are <u>close contacts</u> should refer to the relevant advice available on HealthyWA.

COVID-19 mandatory vaccination policy

The updated mandatory vaccination policy requirements came into effect on 20 June 2022.

The remaining workforces required to be vaccinated to enter their workplace are limited to those working with the most vulnerable in our community, to protect them from severe disease. The affected workforces are:

- healthcare and health support workers in hospitals and primary healthcare settings
- · workers in residential aged care
- workers in residential disability settings.

The <u>Department of Health</u> and <u>WA Government</u> websites have further information available, including frequently asked questions and advice for <u>healthcare</u> and health support workers.

Remote Aboriginal communities

From 15 June 2022, the <u>restriction</u> on access to remote Aboriginal communities will be lifted. Some communities may wish to implement their own closures or requirements of entry, and visitors are encouraged to check before visiting.

COVID-19 in the workplace

WA Health published *COVID-19: Information for Tour Operators*, which provides the tourism industry advice for minimising the risk of COVID-19 transmission. This includes infection prevention and control guidance, what to do if someone tests positive to COIVD-19 and how to manage close contacts. COVID-19 vaccination program

Boosters for eligible 12 to 15-year-olds

The Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) <u>recommends</u> that a booster dose of the Comirnaty (Pfizer) COVID-19 vaccine may be given to the following adolescents aged 12 to 15 years who have completed a primary course of vaccination 3 or more months ago:

- those who are severely immunocompromised
- those who have a disability with significant or complex health needs
- those who have complex and/or multiple health conditions that increase the risk of severe COVID-19.

Self-declaration of eligibility based on the above conditions is all that is required for vaccination.

Currently, Spikevax (Moderna) and Nuvaxovid (Novavax) are not licensed for use as a booster dose in this age group.

ATAGI does not recommend that a first booster dose of COVID-19 vaccine be given to all adolescents aged 12-15 years.

ATAGI still recommends a 3-month interval between a recent confirmed COVID-19 infection and a scheduled dose of COVID-19 vaccine.

COVID-19 Vaccination clinics changes

The Ellenbrook Community COVID-19 vaccination clinic will be closing on Sunday 26 June 2022.

New pop-up clinics are running at selected shopping centres across the Perth metropolitan area, including new clinics at Wanneroo Central, Victoria Park Central, Maddington Central and Newpark Shopping Centre at Girrawheen.

Bookings are not needed, but as these new shopping centre clinics will only be open for 4 to 6 weeks, walk-ins are advised to attend as soon as possible.

COVID-19 vaccination sedation clinic

A sedation clinic is operating to provide COVID-19 vaccinations (primary course and booster doses) for people aged 5 years and older with disability, neurodiversity, or severe needle phobia, who would otherwise remain unvaccinated.

This **free** service is running for a fixed term at Subiaco Private Hospital in the Perth metropolitan area, with the level of sedation dependant on the person's needs. Influenza vaccines can be coadministered at the time of COVID-19 vaccination.

The sedation clinic referral information <u>form</u> can be completed by a health professional, patient or carer.
